The <u>Public History as the New Citizen Science of the Past</u> (PHACS) team at the <u>Center for Contemporary and Digital History</u> (C²DH) (University of Luxembourg) calls for PhD applicants in Public History (f/m)

The *Public History as the New Citizen Science of the Past* (PHACS) team is looking for motivated and qualified candidates who are interested in developing, with our help, an application for an individual <u>AFR PhD grant</u> by the *National Research Fund*.

The doctoral project represents an excellent opportunity for qualified students to contribute to the knowledge and practice of public history in a European context.

If selected for an AFR, the PhD candidate will be offered a **work contract (up to 4 years)** and will work on their PhD thesis with supervisors in the PHACS team.

We particularly welcome applicants who would like to develop a PhD project along the research areas listed below, but other research proposals that contribute to diversify and push the field of public history further, on a practical or theoretical level, are also welcome.

- History, theory and methodology of public history
- Actors, means and infrastructures of collaboration, participation and shared authority in public history
- Public history and/in cultural heritage institutions (museums, archives, foundations...)
- Digital public history

Your profile

- Candidates should have (or expect to achieve) a Master degree in History, Cultural Studies or a related field in the Humanities
- Excellent verbal communication and academic writing skills in English;
- Enthusiasm for research and critical thinking.
- Experience in cultural heritage, cultural institutions, and/or public engagement is an asset

We actively encourage applicants from underrepresented social, economic, and cultural backgrounds to apply, as we strongly believe that an intercultural and diverse team strengthens the research and practice of public history.

Successful AFR applicants will be offered:

- An exciting multi-disciplinary and international research environment with ample opportunities to exchange with scholars at the University of Luxembourg;
- A highly competitive salary for a full-time PhD position for a period of maximum 4 consecutive years (3+1 years);

• A package of mentoring, training and career development as well as access to a wide range of courses and seminars offered by the University of Luxembourg.

Doctoral candidates are encouraged to actively engage in disciplinary, interdisciplinary as well as transferable skills trainings and to develop their scientific profile and network through participation in international conferences.

- 3. a project description for your PhD project (max. 2 pages) that includes the research area, objectives, and (as far as possible) a connection with the PHACS areas of research.

Candidates will be notified of the outcome of their application by the beginning of February. The shortlisted candidates might be invited for virtual interviews soon thereafter.

The deadline for submitting the AFR grant applications is **March 8**, 2023

The applicants will be informed by July 2023 whether the application has been accepted for funding.
